Notes from the Pastor

When was the last time you picked up your Bible? Was it this morning or quite a while ago? In many churches, screens now display scriptures, and the practice of bringing a Bible to worship seems to be fading. Yet reading the Bible is one of the essential spiritual practices of disciples.

There are more than a hundred translations of English Bibles. Which version of the Bible do you have? (Usually, the first page of the Bible tells you which version it is.) I respect whichever version of the Bible you have; my question is, "Do you understand your Bible translation?"

As a young person, The Gospel of John was my least favorite due to its perceived complexity. However, a class on the Gospel of John at seminary transformed my perspective. Concepts like the seven signs, the Johannine community's role in passing on Jesus' stories, and the idea

that the beloved disciple in the gospel could be any of us sparked newfound appreciation.

Join me in a Lenten challenge to read a chapter of John a day, starting the day after Ash Wednesday (February 14, 2024) and concluding just before Palm Sunday (March 24). you will finish reading about the life of Jesus from the Gospel of John just before Holy Week; hence, Easter Sunday may be more meaningful for you. Please consider committing yourself to this daily reading. Even if you miss a day or two, don't worry; you can catch up.

There is a private Facebook Group that you may request to join on Wesley's Facebook page. It is private so we may feel free to have an open discussion. Please post your reflections on the Facebook Group page so that others in the group may enter into a conversation with you about it.

The Sunday morning adult class continues to meet after worship service on Sunday mornings.

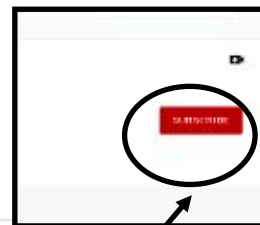

A Brief History

Our mission – Day by Day Shelter collaboratively provides temporary shelter, individualized services, and opportunities for self-sufficiency to empower the most vulnerable adults in our community.

Day By Day Shelter, Inc. was founded by a coalition of community members concerned about the lack of safe, temporary shelter for people experiencing homelessness in the Oshkosh area. With broad community support from local government, police, fire, faith communities and foundations, Day By Day Shelter, Inc. first opened its doors on October 15, 2011.

From the beginning, our mission has been to support the most vulnerable individuals in our community. We strive to treat our guests with dignity and respect, while empowering them toward self-sufficiency and stability.

As of May 2023, Day by Day has more than quadrupled our operations from 25 beds, open 6 months of the year to 50 beds, open 365 days a year. With a new purpose-built shelter, we have also expanded our services and capabilities to meet the growing needs of our organization and our community.

Day By Day Shelter, Inc. is governed by an executive board of directors, and run by a caring and professional staff.

Every dollar makes a difference

As a local organization, Day By Day Shelter raises **95% of its annual operating budget** right here in Winnebago County. We count on the generosity of local businesses, foundations, faith communities and individuals to help ensure safe shelter for anyone who needs it. Your support provides a warm bed, nutritious food and supportive services to help local homeless on the path to self-sufficiency. Here's a small sampling of what your gift can do...

- **\$50** provides safe shelter for one guest for one night
- **\$125** covers the cost of supplies needed to operate the shelter for one week
- **\$1000** covers shelter utilities (water, gas, electric) for one month during the season

Disaffiliation in the UMC

As part of the history of the United Methodist Church (UMC) the latest big issue has been disaffiliation. United Methodists (UM) in the United States make up about half of all UM worldwide, with U.S. congregations representing closer to two-thirds of all congregations in the denomination worldwide.

The number of disaffiliating churches at the end of 2023 was 7662 which is over 25%. The Bishops ruled that Par.2553 does not apply to churches outside of the US meaning the churches in Africa, the Philippines and other places outside the US did not have the opportunity to make the choice. This may be discussed at the General Conference in 2024 with the possibility lessening because of the loss of all the representatives that disaffiliated now ineligible to vote. The process for disaffiliation for US churches ended in 2023. Some churches met resistance along the way and went to court.

One of the offshoots of disaffiliating is that apportionments decreased in most conferences. However, disaffiliating congregations were required to pay two full years of apportionments (current year plus one more) to offset the conference's loss of their funds for the first year of their absence. This gives annual conferences a bit of a financial cushion. The conference sets its own budget so can compensate where necessary. Reductions and realignments will keep conference budgets in line with the number and financial capacity of their congregations.

United Methodist are the largest denominational divide in the United States since the Civil War. While there have been several notable church schisms in the 20th century—including those that gave birth to the Presbyterian Church in America, the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, the North American Lutheran Church, and the Anglican Church in North America—none involve more than 600 or 700 separating congregations. The UMC split is more than 10 times as large.

A new Methodist denomination was launched in May 2022 which now has over 4000 congregations and plans for its first annual meeting in 2024. According to Jay Terrell of the Wesleyan Covenant Association one of the specific changes will be the term-limit for Bishops which has been a significant part of the drama in the disaffiliation because of the lack of accountability of bishops.

A Wesley Theological Seminary study found that the UMC will be smaller, less southern and possibly more diverse. Both exiting and staying churches are united on 1) Jesus was born of a virgin, 2) Jesus died on a cross to reconcile humanity with God, 3) Jesus was resurrected from the dead in bodily form, and 4) today calls people to make disciples for the transformation of the world.

Disaffiliation has not been worked out internationally. The UMC has twice as many members abroad than in the US. At its General Conference in Spring of 2024, UMC is looking at a structure for organizing across continents to allow for regionalization and contextualization of the church hoping to lessen disaffiliation. Jerry P. Kulah a UM leader in Liberia and a leaders of the UMC Africa Initiative says “The effect of that plan would be to compartmentalize sin and make the African church complicit in allowing the US church to adopt unscriptural teachings and standards.” Churches abroad will be looking for an opportunity to disaffiliate as American churches have had the opportunity. Others reiterated their intent to not “forsake the fellowship” despite their theological disagreements around sexuality and marriage.
