### Notes from the Pastor

What would you do if God asked you to challenge everything you thought was true? What if God told you to turn your back on the religious values you learned in church and in the Bible?...Worst yet, what if God changed God's mind to expand the circle of grace to include our nation's worst enemies...?

Moreover, what if the God you believed in...changed the rules of the faith, threw out the spiritual guidebook that shaped your life, and commanded you to adopt a different, and unprecedented, approach to life? Would you follow God's new directions, stay put, or run away from this rule-changing God?...

In the past few decades, committed Christians have struggled with theologically radical ways of reconceiving marriage and divorce, equal rights, war and peace, the insights of other religions, homosexuality and marriage equality, and the nature of mission in light of changing understanding of God's vision

for our world. If God is still speaking, then God can surprise us with new insights for changing times. Like Jonah, we must decide how we will respond to a God whose ways are different than we imagined.

The story of the reluctant prophet to the great city of Nineveh is very familiar. It has even been the subject of children's books, with the tale told from the vantage point of the whale and the poor shriveled up plant that gave Jonah respite from the heat. It is almost comical if we forget Jonah's mean-spiritedness, his refusal to obey, and his childish putting when his enemies repent and God's mercy is accorded to them. He does not want the city to repent-so he can gloat over it's demise....

Jonah was angry at God's mercy that he wanted to die, knowing that the turn of events would ruin his credibility at home!...God rebuked him, expressing concern for the people of Nineveh: "Nineveh has more than a hundred and

twenty thousand people who cannot distinguish right from left....Should I not be concerned for such a great city?" (4:11) This morality tale ends with the questions which is meant to be taken to heart Should not we, a nation of hundreds of millions who "cannot distinguish right from left," also learn mercy and graciousness, become slow to anger and full of love, and relent from imposing harsh penalties in our self-justification?

What if we, Christians in the United States, were sent a Buddhist prophet who lamented our culture of the "gun" and our manufacture and keep on "ready-alert status" millions of nuclear weapons? What if the prophet declared that our treatment of the poor, our exploitation of the world in a way that is destroying it, and our covert low-intensity war policies at home and around the world were destroying any possibility of world harmony and that within forty days we would all be destroyed? Suddenly Jonah's position isn't so laughable but is, rather, worthy of a serious call to examine our national direction.

Jonah asks us what it means to follow God's way in a world of terrorism, masses of immigrants, and a politics of fear. God calls us toward world-changing discipleship in our time. Will we run away from God's vision or follow God's call to embrace otherness, with all our ambivalence and anxiety, or will we baptize our prejudice and hatred in waters of religious faith?

The growth reflects not only the increasing need in our communities, but, also the impact of continued support.

From the desk of the Director of Development: "Summer is in full swing at the Club, and the energy is contagious. From camp adventures to creative projects and everything in between, our team is hard at work making this summer on to remember. As we soak in the summer fun, our team is already planning for a successful school year. Preparations are underway for after-school programming in Oshkosh and Omro, and with the addition of our new site in Winneconne, we're proud to be expanding our reach to serve even more kids across our communities"

The Boys and Girls Club of Oshkosh focuses on five core areas of programming and development that have been nationally proven to address today's most pressing youth issues and assist in teaching young people the skill they need to succeed in life. These areas are: 1. Character & Leadership 2. Education and Career Development 3. Health & Life Skills 4. Sports, Fitness & Recreation 5. The Arts.

In order to provide the children with the services needed (such as after-school care, mental health services, transportation, basic needs services, mentoring, etc.), the Club relies on donations from



outside sources. There is always a need of cleaning products (dish soap, sponges, laundry soap, antiseptic wipes, hand soap, micro-fiber clothes, etc.) Swim suite and swim shorts in all sizes are needed. Gas and grocery gift cards are also very helpful. Cash is always a good option. ### **United Methodist Volunteers in Mission (UM-VIM)**

UMVIM is a grassroots movement within the United Methodist Church designed to provide an official channel for volunteer service. Through UMVIM, Christians (lay and clergy) can offer their skills and talents for service in their home country and around the world on short-term assignments at their own expense.

The UMVIM network offers guidance, organization, and training for more than 125,000 volunteers each year who give of their time and talent to minister with people, build churches and other mission facilities, assist in disaster recovery efforts, participate in community health programs and take part in leadership training events each year.

The key aspects of UMVIM primarily focus on providing short-term volunteer experiences, typically lasting from a few days to a few weeks. It is a grassroots movement driven by the initiative and participation of local churches and individuals. The opportunities include disaster response, construction, healthcare, education, church camps and more. UMVIM emphasizes building relationships with communities and partnering with local leaders to address their needs.

The next VIM trip in our area is to Camp Lake Lucerne which is about an hour from Oshkosh. Lake Lucerne is nestled among over 500 acres of central Wisconsin forest. It was founded in 1947 when Evangelical United Brethren Church purchased the property surrounding the still-pristine lake, and Camp Lucerne was born. Since then, Lake Lucerne Camp and Retreat Center has grown to serve thousands of people very year as we continue the legacy of outdoor ministry into the future. We invite you to come and experience God's live-changing.

The closest VIM trip held this year is September 21-26, 2025. The cost is \$200.00 which includes lodging, meals, work supplies, and a donation to camp. You will need to bring your own sleeping gear and towels for this trip. The trip focus is on getting the camp site ready for winter and correction problems that have developed during the summer months. Approximately 35-50 adults of all ages come together to paint, repair, bring in water equipment, clean the grounds and the cabins. All work is done under the direction of the VIM directors and staff at Lake Lucerne. Ask our mission team about this or other possibilities available for Volunteers in Mission in Wisconsin and around the USA.

Lake Lucerne Camp and Retreat Center is a place where people in an increasingly disconnected word can come together to build connection to community and their faith through unique experiences in God's creation. Th year-round facilities offer the perfect setting for summer camps, weekend or longer retreats, school trips, or day long gathering for youth, adults, and families.
